5. Honors (2 additional courses required)

Candidates for Honors must have above average grades (**3.8 GPA in concentration**) and shall apply for this distinction in writing to the Director of the Program by the middle of the second semester of their junior year. They shall include a cover letter with a brief statement of the intended research proposal as well as the name of the member of the Urban Studies faculty who would serve as their advisor and with whom they must work closely. Twelve courses are required for Honors concentrator, two in addition to the ten courses required for a standard program. During the Fall and Spring of the senior year, honors candidates must complete two additional courses beyond the ten courses required by the regular concentration: **URBN 1981 Senior Honors Thesis I in Urban Studies(S/NC)** and **URBN 1972 Senior Honors Thesis II in Urban Studies (grade)**. The candidate's final thesis must be of outstanding quality in order to qualify for honors.

Thematic Clusters in Urban Studies

The Urban Studies concentration does not have set tracks, but we do offer courses across a range of **thematic clusters** that enable students to hone their skills, deepen their knowledge, and discover new interests in our highly interdisciplinary program. There are currently eight thematic clusters: *Urban Communities and Social Movements*; *Built Environment, Architecture, Planning, and Design*; *Urban Ecologies*; *Historical Urbanism*; *Urban Politics, Policies, and Economies*; *Global Urbanisms*; *Urban Arts and Humanities*; and *Urban Education*.

Students are encouraged to take three or more of their concentration requirements in one of the thematic clusters that speaks to their primary interest in urban studies and two or more courses from two or more other thematic clusters. This helps to ensure that students will graduate with **both a breadth and depth of knowledge** in the field of urban studies.

For example, a student interested in *Urban Communities and Social Movements* might take 3 courses in this field to anchor their studies, complemented by 2 in *Urban Ecologies*, 2 in *Historical Urbanism*, and 1 in *Global Urbanisms* to craft a well-rounded degree. (You will also notice that some classes are grouped under more than one cluster.)

These thematic clusters are not requirements, but rather a **navigational tool** to help students and advisors understand – and make the most of – the diverse course offerings in our program.
